Special interest programs

Westfield State University will be hosting its SAT Summer Institute from July 31 to Aug. 3. This program is an intensive test prep program that provides students with the tools they need to prepare for the SAT. Class sessions use real test questions to show just how these skills are assessed on the SAT exam. The cost is \$499 and includes all required books and materials. Springfield Technical Community College is offering a summer bridge program (STEM Starter Academy) for students interested in STEM-related careers.
