plans, rework them with the town in mind and both explore and present findings to residents at a future town meeting.

"It has to be right for Hampden," he said, adding a town project cannot benefit any one person or group.

O'Brien explained their ballpark estimate at this time is a project in the vicinity of \$6 million, but the size and scope have yet to be determined. Noting the impacts to residents for borrowing such a sum of money, he said the town applied for a \$2 million MassWorks grant.

"But [applying for the grant] does not obligate us to do it," Flynn assured.

"I want to know the benefits to me," resident Charlie Clines asked the committee. "Right now I see this as having very little value for me."

Flynn commented that was the reason for forming the group. He said the intent would be to start with a project that could tie into the town's affordable housing in Centennial Commons on Springmeadow Lane. Such a project could also allow for increased business development as owners would no longer need well and septic systems. But he reiterated that there were no plans or costs to present.

"We're in a due dili-

gence process right now," O'Brien said, noting once they have information to report it will be reported and presented to the residents.

"It's the rumor mill that creates the angst," resident Jack Arute said of the gathering of folks for the meeting. "These are genuine concerns ... if we get a \$2 million grant and we're going to spend \$6 million, something doesn't smell right."

Resident Alan Fritts asked if the town has approached the city of Springfield to see whether they would support the town tying in to their supply. Flynn commented that they have and that the process requires negotiating with the town of East Longmeadow. Springfield, Flynn noted, recently lost a large customer in Montanto that used nearly 3 million gallons per day, far exceeding the usage estimated for Hampden.

Flynn noted East Longmeadow's Chestnut pumping station may require substantial upgrades depending on how far the project goes, which could require a contribution from Hampden.

"I think it has some potential," Gagliarducci said of the idea for water and sewer connections in town. "It has the potential to change the community

forever."

So that he and his committee members could make informed decisions, Gagliarducci encouraged residents to submit their questions to the Selectmen's Office.

Once the committee got to its agenda, member Joe Kruzel announced he needed to remove himself

from the committee, as he works for Springfield Water and Sewer and membership would represent a conflict of interest. The group voted to name Andrew Netherwood, Fritts and Town Accountant Cliff Bombard to the committee.

The group formed a subcommittee to work on

potential phases for the project. Flynn, Langone and Gagliarducci will explore those options. Once the group has ideas for the size and scope, Gagliarducci suggested he and O'Brien should contact U.S. Rep. Richard Neal's office.

"We have to design a plan for Hampden,"

Gagliarducci said. "We've been working on an initial plan from GreatHorse but we need to map this out and make it look like our plan."

"We're dealing with a town that's not growing," he continued. "Could it bring in more housing ... There's much to discuss."

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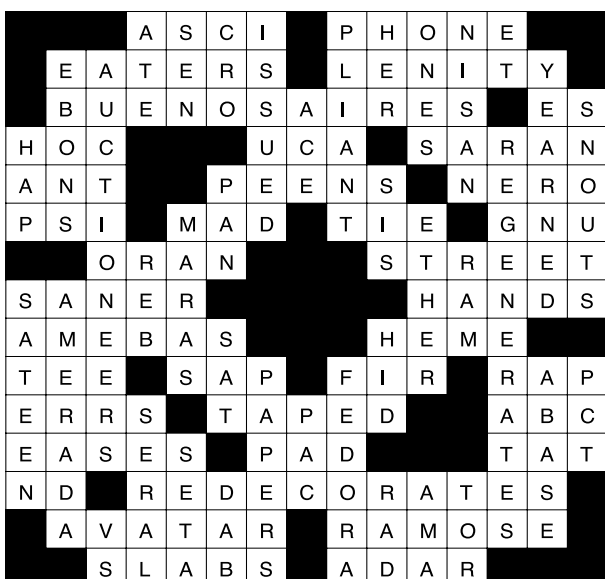
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
