SNAP processing equipment available

NATION – Free mobile SNAP processing equipment from Novo Dia Group is available to direct-marketing farms and farmers markets through the Department of Transitional Assistance, in collaboration with the Department of Agricultural Resources, and with financial support from the United States Department of Agriculture. Eligibility is limited to SNAP-authorized farms and markets that do not currently have working equipment received through previous federal grants. Equipment will not process credit/debit.

There will be two application rounds in 2022.

Winter: Limited to farms or farmers markets that sell during January, February or March. The application period is open now through Feb. 18.

Spring/summer: Open to all eligible farms or farmers markets. If you are not open for the winter season, sign up here for a reminder to be notified when the spring/summer application period opens. The application period will open April 20 and will close Sept. 23, or earlier if funds run out.

Cross Blood Drive." She remembered how Chrobak routinely went above and beyond for all the students.

"I had the pleasure of teaching my entire 35 years at Pathfinder Regional with Judy Mercier, who was also in the '35-year Club,'" she said.

"She not only taught Speech for 35 years, but she also opened her classroom to students who needed that shoulder, or caring ear, or a simple hug, which students need at times. To speak of Teaching the 'old school' way – that was the mold she came from and this is what the students enjoyed about her. No nonsense and down to work. Respect and pride. Accountability. Things not always found in books, but from giving her time to her students. That was my friend Judy."

Mercier also can attest to her most old-school approach in the classroom.

"She never ever read an IEP before meeting the students," Mercier said.

"She didn't want to read some state report about them – she wanted to get to

know them first. She knew what they needed. A lot of times it was encouragement they needed more than extra help. She believed in them. She didn't want anyone to fail. She was their cheerleader or nagging mother, always making sure everything was done on time or she would argue for an extension. Behind the scenes, she always advocated for those students with administration and the other faculty. She didn't take any nonsense and always spoke up on their behalf – a lot of times without them even knowing. There were a few who dropped out which was disappointing, but after her pleas with them most came back and finished!"

Students and their parents tended to reach out since Chrobak's retirement, according to Mercier, who was her mom's caregiver for the past two years.

"She would always get cards, letters, or gifts randomly from her friends or students which I referred to as her 'fan club,'" she said.

"She was feisty but fun! I will miss our many adventures together."
